In all my years of school from about high school on, I was one of those students who sat in the front row, and felt compelled to raise my hand to offer an answer to every question. I felt inadequate if I didn't know the answers and so tried to always have one. It was exhausting. And it was impossible. I will never know all the answers...and yet the idea of giving up the endless search for answers seems...well, it seems like giving up.

Yesterday I sat with a woman at the bedside of her dead nephew. We spent hours together and I listened to her sharing her family's story, said the rosary with her, and we talked about the closeness of God. It was all in Spanish and I understood less than half of what she said, but I discovered that it didn't matter because we had a mutual sense of presence. Presence and bearing witness are powerful gifts that we can offer one another in the face of Mystery.

I resisted the idea of mystery for a long time and thought for many years that the purpose of theology was to nail down answers about the things I couldn't see. Turns out that mystery is bigger than any answers I ever came up with. Turns out that life is more filled with mystery than with matter. Life is more precious lived in good company and the unanswerable – not just unanswered, but unanswerable questions – than spent in frenetic pursuit of temporary respite from the vastness of our truest nature. We may need to give up chasing elusive answers but we need not give up pursuing life; we can open to its pursuit of us.
